In Europe, while access to education is generally higher, disparities remain due to language barriers, cultural differences, and lack of representation. Webinars and training, like those offered through the VOC project, address these gaps by providing targeted education on civic rights, policy advocacy, and leadership development, enabling migrant girls to navigate the complexities of their new communities. By learning about civic engagement, young women gain insight into democratic participation, civic rights, and community involvement, ensuring they are active contributors to change. Furthermore, advocacy and policy change training teaches how to influence decision-making, giving them the tools to challenge inequalities and push for policies that reflect their needs and aspirations.

Empowering Young Women: Building Confidence and Leadership Through Education

Beyond knowledge acquisition, education is key to fostering confidence and leadership among young women. Statistics from the European Institute for Gender Equality (EIGE) indicate that women, especially those from migrant backgrounds, remain underrepresented in leadership roles across Europe, with only 3.7% of EU political leaders being women of foreign descent. This underrepresentation is largely due to systemic barriers, lack of mentorship, and limited access to networks. By offering leadership-focused training, the VOC project provides young women with the confidence to take on decision-making roles, whether in politics, business, or social initiatives. Media literacy and communication skills further enhance their ability to articulate ideas effectively and advocate for change, while training on overcoming barriers helps them address challenges such as discrimination, cultural biases, and language barriers. Moreover, understanding the European Union's policies and funding opportunities ensures that these young women can access resources to support their initiatives, contributing to long-term economic and social empowerment.
